We hope you will see much to interest you this afternoon, and we shall be happy to answer any questions while you are here. We greatly appreciate your attendance.

Our grateful thanks go to Messrs. Clayton, Son and Co. Ltd. for their helpful co-operation in holding this Steam Gala, and to the pwners of the traction engines, steam rollers and organs for bringing along their interesting exhibits.

The Railway is operated by a voluntary society of enthusiasts. It handles traffic for Messrs. Claytons(gas and boiler engineers and steel fabricators) and for Messrs. Robinson and Birdsell (scrap metal merchants) Trains are run several times a week to Balm Road (British Railways)

The line is literally world famous. Built in 1758, it is the oldest operating railway anywhere in the world. In 1812 it introduced the first ever commercially successful steam locomotives. Operation by the Middleton Railway Trust began in 1960, and today it is the only freight system in the world operated by unpaid volunteers— history on your doorstep!.

A description of the railway vehicles you can see is contained in the Middleton Railway Trust Stock Book, available on the sales stand. A description of road vehicles attending can be found overleaf.

Our Officials are here to help you and the engineers in charge of the locomotives will gladly give the technically minded more detailed information.

Road vehicles and other items on display

Mann Tractor No.1260 4 h.p. Owned by L & W Cole, Leeds. Built in 1917. A Leeds made Engine designed for agricultural use, such as direct ploughing, threshing, hauling, etc. Quite a few were made, the last one in 1928, which is still in existence

Aveling and Porter No.9228 'Barbara' 4 h.p. double crank compound, Owned by W.Payne, Doncaster. Built in 1921 and supplied to Hereford C.C. Overhauled and renamed in 1965.

Foden No. 13120 Overtype Wagon. 3 speed single chain drive. Owned by W. Fearnley, of Castleford. Built in 1928. Previous owners were Openshaw Brewery Co., J. Ashworth, Cheshire and Scientific Roads Ltd., Queensferry. Returned to Fodens in 1934 and was fitted with pneumatic tyres. Bought by present owner in 1957.

Foden No. 12364 Overtype Wagon. Owned by H. Parkin, Castleford. Built in 1926 as a 'C.H.3' type Tipper, but was purchased in 1936 by Tarroads Ltd., of London, and converted to a tar sprayer and sent to Kendall Depot. It was later fitted with pneumatics in 1939 and bought by Woods, of Yeadon, who ran it until purchased by present owner as scrap.

Aveling and Porter No 8506 'White Rose' 4 h.p. 8 ton. Owned by D. Rayner, Woodlesford, Leeds. Built in 1915 for Messrs. Free of Marlsborough, Wilts. Came to West Riding from Sleaford Lincs before last war. Purchased from J.Rogers and Son by the White Rose Steam Traction Company in whose ownership this roller was steamed over 600 miles in 3 years to attend rallies in Yorkshire.

Aveling and Porter No 11093 6 h.p. Built 1925. Owned by Mr. Day, Mr. Peach, and Mr. Robinson, Dewsbury, Yorks. Purchased 1967. Overhauled and repainted by present owners.

Aveling and Porter No. 12467 8 ton. D.D. type piston valve compound. Owned by Messrs. Carr and Mettar, of Sheffield. Built 1929 for Bilston U.D.C. has extra wide roller for tarmac. Sold into preservation in 1960s. Has travelled over 400 miles to rallies in the last two years.

Fowler No 17585 'Jane Linda' 3½ h.p. 17½ tons. Built 1929. Owned by J. Griffiths and H.G. Oldroyd. Only one previous owner, M.Harrison, Pudsey. Last worked 1966. Bought in 1967, repainted and overhauled last wonter. Named 'Jane Linda' after owner's wife-to-be.

1930 Tipper Truck HL 4911 22.5 h.p. Willys Overland Crossley, Manchester manufacture with Clayton Dewandre rack tip gear (hand operated) Owned-by Eric Harold Walters of Castleford.

Oddsmobile built by Apprentices of Hunslet Engine Company and winner of the 'Yorkshire Evening Post' Competition
