Retirement Message from Dr R.F. Youell

It is rarely that I am taken completely off balance by surprise. This most certainly happened on May 2nd., when I had planned to hand over my office and then quietly to fade away. Nothing could have been more unexpected, and nothing could have been more appropriate, than an original style Claud Hamilton 1900 picture, which faces me from my wall as I write this note. It will take pride of place in a house full of Great Eastern Relics.

My only regret is that in ten and a half years I have not done more. Being pioneers in Preservation, we have made more mistakes than most, but none of us is perfect. I have blasphemed at Committees, battered with sledgehammers and played Hades right left and centre, in trying to make haste slowly.

It is my regret that for nine of my ten and a half years in the Chair I have been on the sick list as often as not, and my friend Dr Lawrence will agree with me that laying track singlehanded is not the best therapy for a long-suffering stomach.

I predict with confidence that you will receive as much hard work and leadership from my successor Joe Lee as you have from me, but with less fuss and bother.

Only having the Riot Act read to me by the Medical Profession as to what will happen if I don't ease up has induced me to put common sense before showmanship, and give up a job for the Trust that I shall remember always.

Like Richard Deeley I shall give up office and go back to research work. I have at least never asked any member to do a job I could not do myself. The only task I can do well is to plan and lay permanent way. I should therefore be glad if the Trust would remember me by nearly a mile of track which I have left behind, and nothing else. My sincere thanks to all members for such a kind farewell.

Happy Birthday to Us

We do hope that you have been careful in opening the envelope containing this newsletter, since it is a souvenir of the tenth Anniversary of amateur operation at Middleton. Ten years ago, people turned up their nose at the idea of a group of amateurs taking over a full-sized railway line (in shocking condition at that) and operating it in a safe and sensible manner. Their eyebrows were raised even higher when we announced that we intended to work goods traffic on a year-round daily basis. It is our proud boast that, still today, we alone among all the preservation societies which now exist are the only ones to run a service every day of the year if required. Every one of us who has contributed to our unique record during these ten years has his own set of anecdotes relating to the vast range of incidents, amusing or not so amusing, so there is no need for us to dwell on them here.

We congratulate all members on the achievements of our first ten years, and we hope that our anniversary will be the occasion of redoubled efforts to make the next decade even more successful than the first.

Rules: Observance thereof.

Following a regrettable and inexcusable incident recently, the Middleton wagon has been declared to be damaged to such an extent that it will never be fit for traffic again, and must now be treated purely as a museum exhibit. This occurred because of careless driving by unauthorised members without supervision.

The Rules & Disciplinary Subcommittee is currently investigating this occurence, but meanwhile stress that any member found driving a locomotive without either holding a current driving pass, or being supervised by a member holding such a pass, will be liable to severe disciplinary action.

The Third (revised) Edition of the Rules and Regulations, which replaces all previous issues (now out of print), is being printed and will be issued to all members as soon as possible. Meanwhile members working at the line are asked to consult Committee members and Officers if they are in any doubt as to whether the job which they are doing is affected by the new provisions, which have been introduced primarily in connection with the operation of regular trains for visitors.

Middleton goes Pop

In response to much demand, particularly from loco. crew, Middleton is selling bottles of pop at the line on weekend afternoons. Crisps are also available. This will add to the revenue which the Trust obtains as an indirect result of running the weekend visitors' service, and members who help at the line will now be able to obtain refreshment during the afternoon. This catering service will be maintained on as many occasions as possible, but the shortage of willing hands, particularly on Saturdays, has prompted Tim White to ask for help with transporting the refreshments to and from the line.

The Commemorative Cover to mark the Tenth Anniversary of running our first train has been selling well. If there are any left on June 20th, these will be posted to Tim with peelable address labels so that they can be sold as first day covers. Members are advised to place an early order for these exceptionally fine souvenirs, as they appear almost certain to become collectors' items. They can be obtained at a price of 3/6d each from Tim.

A new publication added to stock is the British Locomotive Preservation & Light Railway Stocklist. This excellent publication contains a sizeable reference to Middleton. Copies are available at 7/6d each.

The Middleton Railway Guide

A new publication appeared for sale on 20th June.
