VISITORS' SERVICE

The numbers of passengers carried each afternoon increased by almost 50% last year, and is expected to be even greater this year. If you want a clean job at the Railway, candidates for posts as ticket clippers and stewards on the train and on the platform are always welcome, and particularly so on Sundays, when our greatest numbers of people travel. The jobs are clean, easy, and require no technical expertise: just stopping people from sitting on the wagon-side, from turning on the brake when the guard is outside, from standing too near the platform edge when the train is coming, and just chatting them up to make them feel welcome - a customer who feels welcome usually comes back. Sales assistants are also always in demand: again, no technical expertise is required - just the ability to smile at the customers and do simple addition and subtraction of money.
