Note from the Chairman

I have been approached by the Manager of Messrs. Clayton & Son who is concerned generally regarding the doubtful behaviour of members of M.R.T. There have been occasions when members have not shown respect for persons or property when in the yard used by the Trust.

In future, permission MUST BE SOUGHT from a responsible member of Messrs.

Clayton's before any use of their property is made.

If the behaviour problem does not improve, then use of the yard will be prohibited forthwith.

This leads to my second point, which is made with a view to improving the general efficiency of the Trust. I had occasion to visit the yard on the evening of Saturday, 27th June. There were at least a dozen members in attendance who had only achieved the lighting of a fire in the frame of a steam crane cwned by Clayton's. In future members visiting the railway are requested to do so with the intention of doing some specific task, not using the site as a centre for childish acts.

Members who are not gainfully employed, are, as far as I am concerned, not valuable, and should not renew their membership. In future members not making objective contributions to the well being of the Trust will be asked to resign membership.

This is not a personal attitude towards any particular member. Indeed it is a proposal to increase our working membership so as to give a progressive image to the general public, and most of all, to the City who hold our future existence in their hands.
