largely thanks to the enthusiasm and persistence of Ben Wade a locomotive highly suitable for moving M.R.T. traffic has been unearthed and it is hoped that it will be possible to purchase it as a first-reserve-loco for the M.R.T.

The engine is a Bagnall 0-4-0 saddle tank, number 2702 of 1942/3, built for a Monk Bretton Ministry of Power factory. It has been used recently at Cohen's Works, Stanningley, nr. Leeds.

Members of the Steam Power Trust are working hard on the Y7 with the result that it is almost ready for its hydraulic test.

The diesel is now all dark blue but we are still experiencing difficulty in obtaining parts for the compressor given to us by Broom and Wade.

Several pieces of the now derelict level crossing gates have been stolen. Norman Fearnley had cut them off ready to load on a train and was amazed to find that these very heavy parts had disappeared before he could get there!

On Tuesday evening of 24th August, the heaviest out train for some time was despatched in appalling conditions. A cloud burst during the run made the approach to B.R. on the 1 in 70 gradient a real test of skill for the crew of Norman Fearnley and Barry Wood.
