Engineering Progress. On Saturday 24 October, Henry de Lacy II cracked a boiler tube and limped home spurting. We didn't make things easier by ordering replacements a few inches too short! Considering the work is all spare time volunteer effort, it is very nice to report that Henry was back in steam minus leak in a week. The C.M.E. staff unloaded a wagon of coal from Garforth within hours of arrival, stoking us up for the winter. Bringing coal INTO Middleton Railway instead of out is regrettably the new order, at least it IS coal, and good loco, coal at that. Thanks, N.C.B. even if we are old fashioned in our fuel policy. A complete strip and refit of John Alcock has taken place over the last 3 years, and she is now running, minus the old rattles and squeaks from worn bearings, in good condition, with a repaint as well. Oh! Dear. Owing to some lack of co-ordination, Leeds City Works Dept. has dumped many tons of rubble right where the new branch line to Birdsell's is to be built. This is entirely different from the plan agreed with the City Engineer's Department. It is not only annoying but dangerous when our shunters have to stumble over piles of rubble alarmingly close to the track. A new common crossing has also been damaged by careless behaviour with bulldozers. Gates put up by the same people were vandalised within a week. A contractor, acting we understand for Evans of Leeds Limited, dumped tarmacadam on the line and steamrollered it to rail level. Our engineers request for advance consultation and proper check clearances were responded to in a vulgar manner. Out P.W. team dug up the resulting mess before it had set. Owing to another piece of confusion, a rather decrepit foot crossing has been put in from Beza Road in a place not approved of by M.O.T. rules. We are investigating.
