## TRAFFIC MANAGER'S REPORT

Freight traffic figures from Robinson & Birdsell's were again down this year, the total tonnage being 4,645 compared with 5,360 last year and 5,832 the year before. Clayton's scrap traffic from Moor End to Robinson & Birdsell's has been only 6 tons, with nothing for over 6 months now. Traffic is still moving four or five days each week, and although we never run Friday trains there have been no troubles about demurrage charges. We still need more drivers and shunters from members living in Leeds, as we experience considerable difficulties in finding crews to move traffic in the University vacations.

Special visitors trains for organised parties have been a feature of the year, bringing in more than £50. Although usually diesel hauled, we did have a special steam day in June, when 500 children from five Leeds schools were carried. This alone brought in £22, and was much enjoyed by crews, teachers and children.

The figures for the regular visitors' service are given elsewhere.
